Nevertheless, we still have to make tactical and strategic decisions upon which our individual and collective well-being depends. It is commonly asserted that critical thinking can help us navigate this cognitively complex landscape, but what that means in practice is not always well-articulated. What does it mean to critically analyse or evaluate something, for example, and how is it different from just analysing or evaluating it? What is it that critical thinkers are critical about? In this presentation, we will consider how educators can use their understanding of criticality to better shape learning experiences and lesson design to focus on the thinking skills so necessary for success in an information dense world. | Dr Peter Ellerton |
